WHAT DOES A SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER DO?

Three years ago, COVID had become an ever-changing issue, mask debates were a hot topic, and a new president was getting ready to take charge of the United States. One evening, I was scanning Facebook and came across a post that mentioned Wilmot Union High School had two vacant seats on the school board and to be perfectly honest, I did not really know what a school board member did. Thankfully, attached to the post was a "Guide for Candidates" that answered almost all the questions I had. After reading over the guide my interest was perked and I wanted to have an impact on what was happening in our schools.

Fast forward three years and I have a much clearer understanding of what a school board member does, and I would like to share what some of the key takeaways were, from my perspective.

- · All Children: First and foremost, board members are advocates for all children of the district. Whetherathletics, fine arts, Academic Decathlon, Tech Ed or something else is important to you individually, we mustadvocate for all children of the district.
- · Policy and Governance: These are the two words I kept hearing at my first board member training session. We are representatives of the community from which each one was elected and stewards of the district's tax dollars.As such, the board should establish goals and standards(policy) for the district to aim for while ensuring accountability to those goals and standards (governance).
- · Chain of Command: The superintendent is responsible for running the district, while the board is responsible for making sure the district is run well. With that being said, the only employee who directly reports to the board is the superintendent. It is the superintendent's responsibility to handle concerns about any of the

administration, teachers or other staff members once the other proper chain of command has been followed.

- · Board vs. Board Member: Decisions affecting the district are made when meeting as a board. As individual board members, we really don't have any more authority or power than any other member of the district.
- · Listen: There will be times that unpopular decisions, controversial topics or hot button issues come up and members of the community want input. Listen to everyone and remind yourself, we are advocates for all children of the district.

Finally, I would like to make sure and clarify this is my opinion and not the opinion of the board of education or Wilmot Union High School District.

A MESSAGE FROM DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR, DR. MICHAEL PLOURDE REDEFINING READY

Dear Wilmot Union High School Community,

I hope Thanksgiving provided you and your loved ones with some excellent quality time together. In October's issue of WUHS Today, I introduced Redefining Ready, a program we've adopted to measure students' college and career readiness. The Redefining Ready metrics are based on an extensive body of research. Students are **College Ready** if they meet either the academic indicators OR standardized testing benchmarks listed below.

Academic Indicators

GPA 2.8 out of 4.0 and one or more of the following academic indicators:

- Advanced Placement Exam (3 or better)
- Advanced Placement Course (C- or better)
- Dual Credit College English and/or Math (C- or better)
- Algebra II (C- or better)

Standardized Testing Benchmarks (minimum score)

- SAT Exam: Math (530) | Reading and Writing (480)
- ACT Exam: English (18) | Reading (22) | Science (23) | Math (22)

Students are Career Ready if they meet two of the behavioral and experiential benchmarks listed below.

- 90% Attendance During Freshman Year
- Work Based Learning Experience
- Industry Credential
- Dual Credit Career Pathway Course (C- or better)
- Two or More Organized Co-Curricular Activities

Our staff will use this data to inform decisions as we continue to improve the student experience at Wilmot Union High School. Some key takeaways worth noting include:

- A tremendous number of students are taking dual credit courses at WUHS, earning college credits in high school.
- The number of students taking AP exams has decreased as we've added additional dual credit courses through Gateway Technical College, UW-Parkside, and UW-Whitewater.
- Students are participating in large numbers in our substantial co-curricular offerings.
- Many students are earning industry credentials through our robust career and technical education programs.
- Freshmen attendance rates have dropped significantly after COVID-19. This is a huge challenge, and we continue to ask for your help to get your students to school every day. Students need to be here daily to maximize their potential.
- COVID-19 continues to have an enduring, negative impact on many students' academic performance.

A lot of effort has gone into collecting and preparing the Redefining Ready data and scorecard, and I'm excited to get to work on our opportunities for growth and celebrate our success. If you have any questions about the scorecard, please feel free to reach out.

A MESSAGE FROM ASSOCIATE PRINCIPAL, DANIEL BENDER DISCIPLINE REFERRALS FROM SEPTEMBER-NOVEMBER

Hello Wilmot Union High School Families,

I would like to update everyone with some data about our discipline and attendance. Both play a key factor in the success of our students.

Discipline Referrals from September-November:

Attendance/Truant	293	256
Disruptive Behavior	119	44
Insubordination	66	44
Improper Use of Technology	51	30
Alcohol, Tobacco, or Other Drugs	10	8
Total Referrals	790	451

Summary: Attendance and truancy referrals are down, but it remains the #1 issue at Wilmot. Having good attendance is extremely important when it comes to student success.

All other behavior referrals are down. Steps have been taken for classroom intervention. The key for behavior and discipline

management is the relationship between the teacher/student/parent. All of us can work together and resolve matters as they arise.


Summary: There is a decrease in all actions besides lunch detentions. We are utilizing lunch detention rather than the after school detention because the late bus is not available this school year.

Referrals to law enforcement are down considerably. We are intentialling working with students and parents before referring to law enforcement.

A MESSAGE FROM ASSOCIATE PRINCIPAL, DANIEL BENDER (CONTINUED) ATTENDANCE

High school attendance is crucial for several reasons, encompassing academics, mental health, socialization, and extracurricular activities. Here is a current breakdown of this current school year:

Chronic Absenteeism: Per DPI, a student is considered chronically absent if that student misses 10% or more school days. The current student chronically absent rate at Wilmot Union High School is 33%. This is a very high rate and staff is working with families to help get students to school.



2022-2023

• Academics:

 Learning Opportunities: High school is where students receive a structured education. Regular attendance ensures that students have access to the curriculum, lessons, and resources necessary for their academic development.

2023-2024

• Grades and Performance: Consistent attendance is often correlated with better grades and academic performance. Missing school can lead to gaps in understanding, making it difficult for students to catch up later.

• Mental Health:

- Routine and Structure: Attending school provides a daily routine and structure, which can contribute to mental stability and reduce anxiety and stress for students.
- Support Systems: School counselors, teachers, and peers can provide emotional support and resources for students dealing with mental health challenges. Consistent attendance allows students to access these support systems.

• Socialization:

- Peer Interaction: High school is a time for adolescents to interact with peers and form meaningful relationships. Regular attendance enables students to build friendships and develop social skills, which are essential for their personal growth.
- Diverse Experiences: High school is a diverse environment with students from various backgrounds. Regular attendance exposes students to a wide range of perspectives, cultures, and ideas.

• Extracurricular Activities:

- Skill Development: Extracurricular activities such as sports, clubs, and arts programs offer students opportunities to develop skills, interests, and talents outside of academics. Attendance is necessary to participate fully in these activities.
- College and Career Opportunities: Many colleges and employers value extracurricular involvement. Regular attendance in high school
 allows students to explore and excel in these activities, enhancing their college and career prospects.

• Preparation for the Future:

- College Readiness: High school is a critical stage for college preparation. Regular attendance ensures that students receive the necessary education and guidance to meet college admission requirements.
- Workforce Readiness: Even for students not pursuing higher education, attending high school instills essential skills such as punctuality, responsibility, and time management, which are valuable in the workforce.

• Legal Requirements:

o In many places, there are legal requirements for school attendance until a certain age. Parents or guardians may face legal consequences if their child consistently misses school without a valid reason.

· Life Skills:

• High school provides a structured environment where students learn life skills such as problem-solving, communication, and critical thinking. Regular attendance is essential for acquiring and honing these skills.

Dear Families of Wilmot Union High School:

We wanted to take a moment and thank the parents who attended our Q & A Session last Friday morning at Healing Grounds Café & Juicery. We would also like to inform you that we will be hosting another Q & A Session on **December 20** at the high school in **Room**180 before the monthly Board of Education Meeting **from 5-6pm**. We welcome all families to attend who may have questions about Standards-Based Grading or our grading communication tool, Otus.

Some issues or topics that were discussed Friday morning included:

- The number of attempts each student will have to show proficiency in each essential standard
- How this new system will impact GPA or Transcripts
- The potential to "in progress" or change 1st semester grades for year long courses
- An upcoming email from your student before winter break that will provide a progress report for each class that they are in
- Parents requesting to have access to rubrics in which the standards are graded on
- Concerns with multiple logins confusion between Skyward and Otus
- Our teachers using universal language when explaining SBG
- Clarification of Wilmot's ReLearn Policy versus the previous "Retake" Policy
- The impact of SBG on sports/participation
- Supporting our students in this transition process



NURSE NOTES, ELIZABETH REBOLLAR

DID YOU KNOW THAT DECEMBER IS NATIONAL HANDWASHING AWARENESS MONTH.

You can help yourself and your loved ones stay healthy by washing your hands often, especially during these key times when you are likely to get and spread germs:

- Before, during, and after preparing food
- Before and after eating food
- Before and after caring for someone at home who is sick with vomiting or diarrhea
- Before and after treating a cut or wound
- · After using the toilet
- After changing diaper's or cleaning up a child who has used the toilet
- After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
- After touching an animal, animal feed, or animal waste
- After handling pet food or pet treats
- After touching garbage

If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol to clean your hands.

How to wash your hands:

Follow these five steps every time.

- Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold), turn off the tap, and apply soap.
- Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.
- Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.
- Rinse your hands well under clean, running water.
- Dry your hands using a clean towel or an air dryer.
